Introduction

In Delaware, children experience food insecurity in more than one in four households,ⁱ putting the future of our state's workforce, health and economy at a terrible risk. Nevertheless, simple, proven solutions exist - more than 133,000 students in Delaware's public schools regularly receive nutritious meals through their school nutrition program each year, and more than 50 percent of those children qualify for free or reduced-price meals. School nutrition programs provide a safeguard against hunger and malnutrition and an assurance to parents of all incomes that their child can access a nutritious meal away from home.

Unfortunately only 52.1 percent of Delaware's children who receive free or reduced price lunch also participate in school breakfast programs at their school.ⁱⁱ This means that tens of thousands of students who could benefit from a healthy start to the school day instead reach their desks with empty stomachs. Time poses the biggest barrier to breakfast participation - at the start of each school day, students simply do not have enough time to arrive at school, pick up breakfast, eat in the cafeteria and arrive in class on time and ready to learn.

Guided by innovative and compassionate superintendents, principals, teachers, custodians and nutrition staff, schools throughout Delaware are rising to the challenge through a simple, yet effective strategy: moving breakfast into the classroom. Proven models like Grab & Go, Second Chance and classroom delivery have dramatically increased school breakfast participation by more than 400 percent in some schools.ⁱⁱⁱ Teachers report that students are more focused, and have fewer behavioral issues, nurse visits, and absences - some never realized how hungry their students were until they saw the difference that breakfast made. Nationally, kids eating school breakfast score 17.5 percent higher on math tests and attend 1.5 more days of school each year.^{iv} But most importantly, kids eating school breakfast don't start the school day hungry.

This report will delve further in school and district level data to highlight success, as well as to identify common barriers and opportunities for improvement. It will also share best practices from successful schools for administrators, teachers, parents and concerned citizens throughout the state to use as a tool to improve their own breakfast programs.

Breakfast Basics

The Federal School Breakfast Program, regulated by USDA Food and Nutrition Services is administered in Delaware by the Department of Education. Public schools, nonprofit private schools and residential child care institutions are eligible to participate in the program. Schools receive federal reimbursements for each breakfast served. Levels of reimbursement depend upon the family income of each student and whether or not a school is classified as "severe need." Schools receive this classification if at least 40 percent of the lunches served during the second preceding school year were served to students who qualified for free or reduced-price meals.

Nutrition Requirements:

The USDA requires that schools provide four food components to students for breakfast that fall into the three categories below. Students must choose three items for their breakfast.

- Grains (with optional meats/meat alternates allowed)
- Juice/Fruit/Vegetable
- Milk



Free Breakfast for Each Child

Many schools and districts around the country have taken advantage of federal provisions that allow breakfast and/or lunch to be served free of cost to all children. Others have chosen to invest state or local dollars to reach that same end. Offering free meals to all students can simplify logistics, reduce paperwork, increase participation and increase the financial viability of nutrition programs.

Community Eligibility Provision

The Community Eligibility Provision, which will be implemented in Delaware in the 2014-2015 school year, will allow schools and districts with greater than 40 percent direct certification rates to offer breakfast and lunch free of cost to all students, eliminating

applications entirely for qualified schools. Qualifying schools receive the majority of their federal reimbursements at the free rate.

Provision 2

Provision 2 of the National School Lunch Act allows schools to offer meals at no charge while reducing paperwork and simplifying logistics. Provision 2 schools have a “base year,” where meals are given free of charge but the reimbursement category of each meal served is tracked. The base year is used to calculate federal reimbursements by the percentage of students in each reimbursement category. Schools only need to count total meals served and must reapply for Provision 2 every four years.

Universal

Schools providing Universal breakfast and/or lunch provide meals at no cost to all students, but unlike Provision 2, continue to use applications and track the reimbursement category of each meal served to submit to the federal government. These schools sometimes have their budget supplemented by state or local funds in order to provide free meals to all students.

Eliminating Reduced Price Co-pay

Schools, districts or states can choose to eliminate the reduced price co-pay in favor of offering free breakfast and/or lunch to students who qualify for this pricing category. This simplifies pricing logistics and increases participation among low-income children. Funds from state or local government replace the copay and ensure that schools receive adequate reimbursement per meal.



Alternative Service Models

Breakfast Can Be Easy As...

BREAKFAST IN THE CLASSROOM

How it works:

1. Teachers, nutrition staff members or volunteers distribute meals to students from insulated coolers during the first 10-15 minutes of class.
2. Children eat their breakfast while listening to the morning announcements.
3. When finished, the students clear their desks and wipe them down. The teacher will then place the trash bin in the hallway to be collected by custodial staff.

This model works best for students that do not switch classes, since it allows their teacher to easily keep record of meals distributed.



How it works:

1. When students arrive, they are given the option to have either a traditional cafeteria breakfast or choose take-away bag.
2. Students either eat in the cafeteria or they eat their on-the-go breakfast between periods or during a designated nutrition break.
3. Schools provide additional trash receptacles in hallways to collect any trash from the to-go bags.

This model works best for older students that may be hungry upon arriving to school. Meals are recorded via a POS system.

GRAB AND GO

How it works:

1. Students arrive in the cafeteria and fill bags with breakfast items of their choice, or school nutrition staff prepare meal bags to distribute to students in hallway kiosks.
2. Students bring meals to class and consume them during the first 15 minutes.
3. When finished, the students clear their desks and wipe them down. The teacher will then place the trash bin in the hallway to be collected by custodial staff.

This model works best for schools where it is not feasible to deliver meals to each classroom. Meals are recorded via a POS system.

Key Findings

Over the past three years, the state of Delaware as a whole has seen slight gains in breakfast participation. The annual School Breakfast Scorecard released by the Food Research and Action Center found that 52.1 percent of students receiving free and reduced-price lunch also participated in breakfast in the 2012-13 school year, up from 51.3 percent in 2011-12 . While there is still plenty of room for progress, this is a good sign for children at risk of food insecurity.

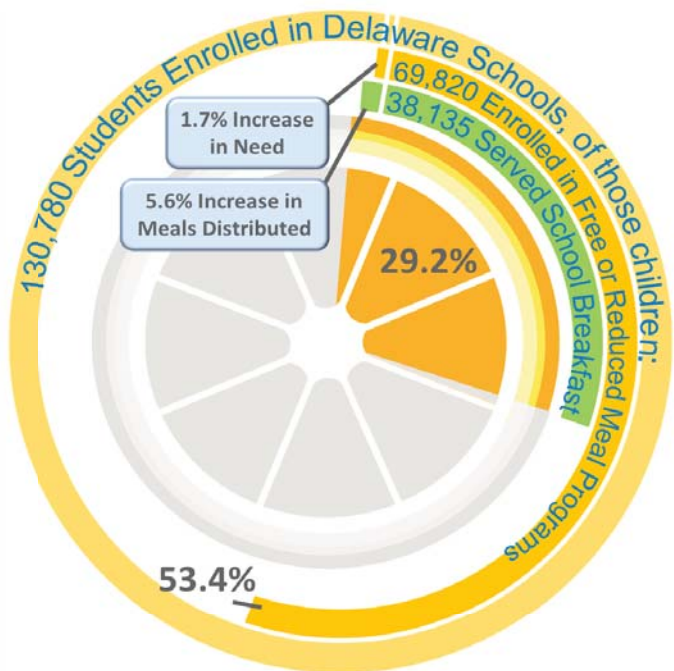
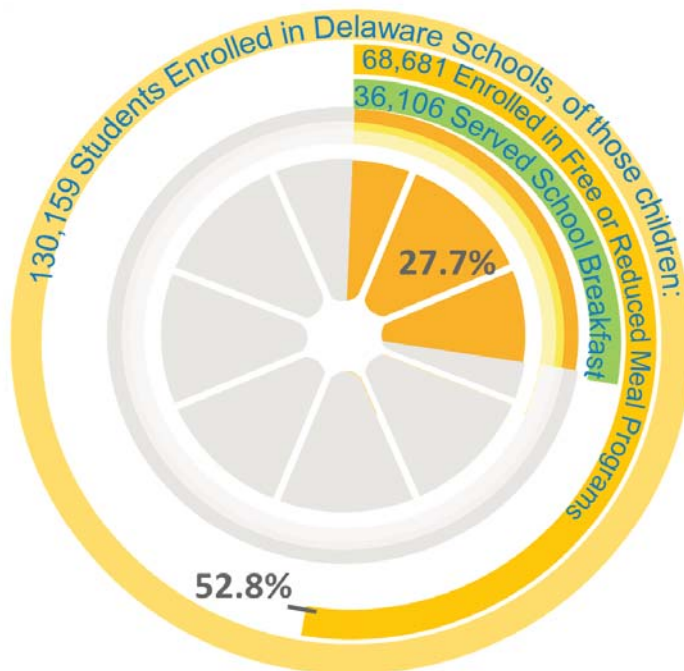
Participation by all students, regardless of income status, is on the rise as well. Each October, the state Department of Education collects baseline participation data from all schools participating in the USDA School Breakfast Program. From October 2012 to October 2013, the percentage of enrolled students receiving breakfast increased from 27.74 percent to 29.16 percent.

What does a 1.4 percent increase in participation mean for children? It means that 2,134 more students were protected from hunger and were given access to a healthy breakfast in 2013!

Alternative Service Models are Making a Difference in Delaware

While increases on the state level are modest, impressive gains can be seen in individual schools. Schools in Delaware are making major strides in breakfast participation using two proven strategies:

1. Bringing breakfast to the classroom through alternative service models, and
2. Offering breakfast free of charge to all students through the pricing methods described in this report.

Participation trends (See Chart 1) show that schools that offer free meals to all students (Universal or Provision 2), as well as schools that use alternative service models for breakfast (Breakfast in the Classroom, Grab & Go), either maintained high rates of participation from October 2012-13 or saw significant increases during this timeframe. Schools that employ both strategies make up the majority of the top-performing schools. The data also proves that breakfast isn't just for schools with large numbers of children who qualify for free and reduced price meals—breakfast works for everybody!

Breakfast in the Classroom, Free Meals for All and What it Means for Kids

How do these strategies benefit kids, teachers, schools and parents?

1. Kids who eat school breakfast attend an average of 1.5 more days of school per year, and score an average of 17.5 percent higher on math tests.^{vii}
2. Eating breakfast reduces the risk of obesity, and the nutrition standards that school breakfasts meet helps children develop healthy eating habits.

Children who eat breakfast are less likely to be overweight, and those who eat school breakfast are more likely to have a diet sufficient in critical vitamins and minerals than children who skip breakfast or eat at home.^{viii}

3. Teachers report that breakfast in the classroom allows for more instructional time at the start of each day.

A calm, orderly and nutritious morning at school leads to a decrease in behavioral issues, as well as an increase in attentiveness and concentration.

4. Having more children eating breakfast means that school nutrition programs can become more financially sound.

FRAC estimates that if Delaware could increase that percentage of children receiving free and reduced-price lunch who also eat breakfast (52.1 percent in 2013) to just 70 percent, Delaware would bring in an additional \$2.6 million in federal reimbursements.^{ix}

5. In Delaware, 40 percent of all children live below 200 percent of the poverty level.^x

Free and accessible breakfast can alleviate the burden of hunger for both the children and their families.

The Community Eligibility Provision will become available in the 2014-2015 school year, allowing schools with large populations of low-income students to provide free breakfast and lunch to all children. Alternative service models will maximize the impact of this policy by ensuring that these meals are accessible.

Common Challenges

In a survey conducted in January of 2014 amongst the state's nutrition service supervisors, the following barriers were identified in implementation of alternative school breakfast models:

1. Lack of administrative support and a sense of resigning to “business as usual.”

Administrators have a variety of responsibilities and pressures that often take precedent over breakfast. But, as many principals and superintendents have realized, hunger in the classroom only makes learning more difficult.

2. Resistance from teachers who fear that it will affect their schedules, their classrooms and their instructional time.

Teachers hard-pressed to improve test scores, develop curriculum and maintain order in their classroom often flinch at the idea of adding something new to the mix. But many teachers have found that breakfast in the classroom improves the quality of the classroom environment and increases instructional time.

3. A belief amongst custodians that breakfast in the classroom will lead to an increased workload beyond their means.

Custodians, teachers and nutrition staff in schools using alternative service models have found that placing special trash cans for breakfast waste and avoiding messy breakfast items, makes for an easy and efficient clean-up process.

4. A lack of awareness amongst parents and the general public as to the importance of breakfast and its easy availability in schools.

To increase visibility, schools, nonprofit and government officials have made efforts to ensure that every family is alerted to the availability of breakfast, and that the general public is made aware through media and events promoting breakfast in the classroom

Despite these barriers, many schools in Delaware have overcome these difficulties to arrive at simple solutions that satisfy administrators, teachers, custodians and students.

Districts at a Glance

Looking at district and charter school-level participation data can give educators, elected officials and parents an idea of where their schools stand on breakfast (See Figures 1 and 2). Comparing these trends with the pricing programs and service models employed by districts or charter schools (See Figure 3) yields valuable information on how schools might work to improve breakfast participation. 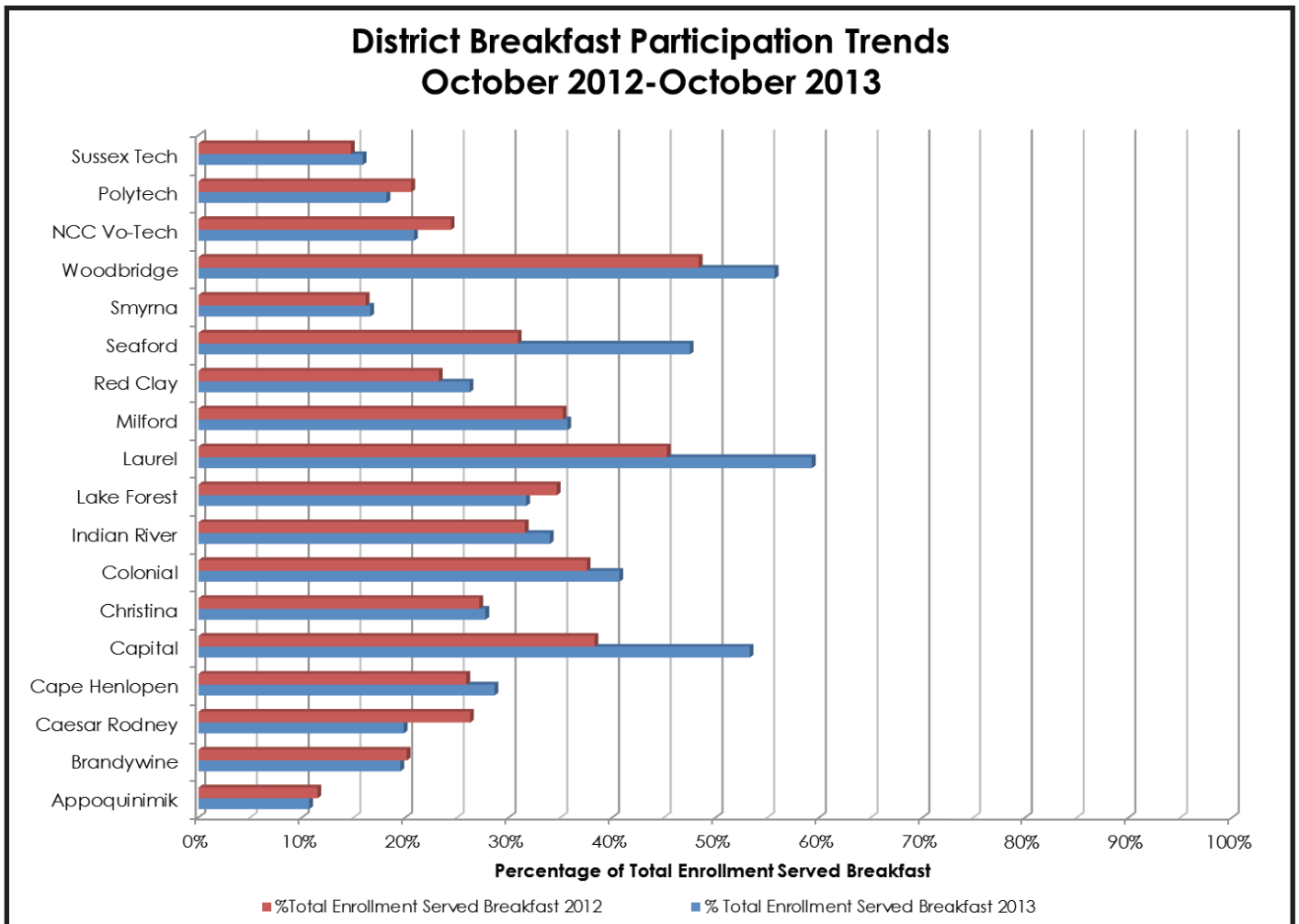
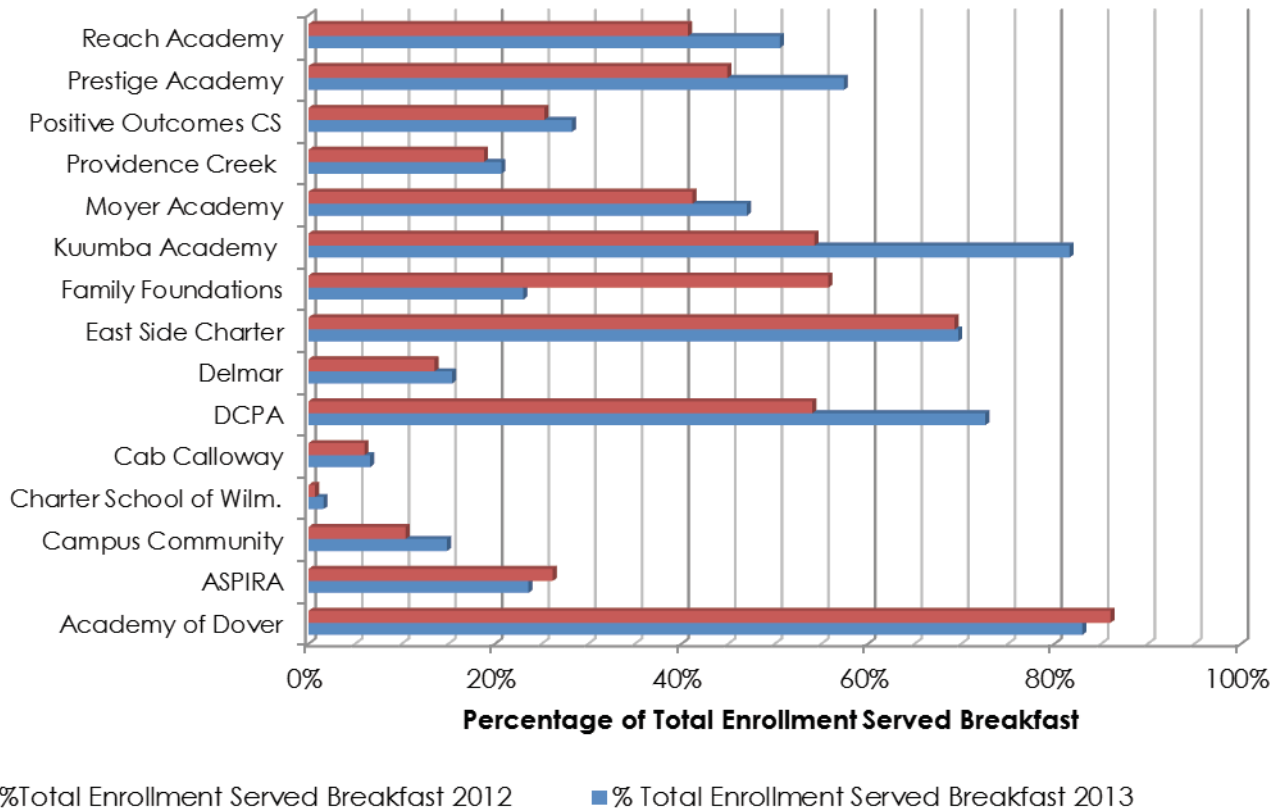

Wilbur uses a cafeteria-based Grab & Go model. Children come off the bus and head directly to the cafeteria, where the kitchen staff has prepared a number of healthy breakfast options. Teacher aides and student teachers are present in the cafeteria to keep the line functioning smoothly.

Each child enters his/her pin number upon reaching the cash register. In the beginning of the year, while children are still learning their number, this slowed the process, but the issue was remediated with time.

Children then take their breakfast to the classroom where they eat, clean up and place their trash in a designated bin. Each classroom has a smaller bin which makes classroom clean up easier. The custodians then travel the hallways to collect all of the trash.



"It gives us an extra half hour where we are able to work one on one with students who need it, to pre-teach information that some students may need, to have students work with each other. It really gives us thirty valuable minutes where we are able to have direct, one-on-one contact with our students."

"One Principal realized the importance of breakfast relative to learning. Principal Kim Simmons was willing to work with the Nutrition Services Department to implement Breakfast in the Classroom. In the Middle School, breakfast has increased from 100 breakfasts per day to a range of 650-725 breakfasts per day due to the alternate style of breakfast service. The principal and teachers have been so enthusiastic about the program and continue to see positive results due to implementation of Breakfast in the Classroom."

Seaford School District's Nutrition Service Supervisor, Patricia Cunningham, saw a challenge and an opportunity at Seaford Middle School. In a school with a large number of students eligible for free and reduced-price meals, only 14 percent were eating breakfast. In the summer of 2013 Patricia worked with Principal Kim Simmons and her staff to bring breakfast to the classroom.

At the start of the 2013-2014 school year, Seaford Middle School began serving breakfast in the classroom. Each morning, students pick up an insulated bag filled with hot breakfasts for all participating students in the classroom. These bags are delivered to each student's "prep period" classroom. The "prep period," 30 minutes long, allows students to start each day with the same teacher and classmates and gives them time to eat breakfast and meet additional educational objectives required by the school.

The teachers at Seaford Middle enjoy the opportunity to eat breakfast with their students and to start the day in a calm, orderly and healthy way. The students enjoy the convenience, and the participation numbers show the impact: between October 2012 and October 2013, Average Daily Participation increased by 481 percent,^{xi} and nearly 92 percent of all students at Seaford Middle now eat breakfast.^{xii}



"I've also had teachers who were against it that have completely come around. I've even had teachers come to me and say, 'I didn't realize how important this was to the kids, I didn't realize how hungry they were.'"

Make your School a Breakfast Champion in the Statewide School Breakfast Challenge!

Do you think your school is a breakfast champion? Then get ready for the 2014 Statewide School Breakfast Challenge, an exciting opportunity for schools making major gains in breakfast participation to win cash awards for their performance! Thanks to a partnership between the Food Bank of Delaware and the Delaware Department of Education, ten awards ranging from \$3,000 to \$500 will be made available to eight district schools and two charter or nonpublic schools. These cash prizes will be awarded to the school with the highest breakfast participation in October 2014 and the most-improved breakfast participation from October 2013 to October 2014. All schools participating in the USDA School Breakfast Program as of October 2013 will be eligible for the challenge.

What can schools and districts do?

- Convene a meeting with nutrition staff, custodians, administrators and teachers to review this report and plan your alternative service model.
- Take advantage of the Community Eligibility Provision if your school or district qualifies.
- Eliminate the reduced-price copay category for schools not eligible for Community Eligibility.

What can our state legislators do?

Feed to Achieve Act

In Delaware, policy experts can learn from West Virginia's innovative legislative approach, which offers the chance of universal free school breakfast for every student in the state.

The West Virginia Feed to Achieve Act became a law in May 2013. This initiative guarantees every child attending school in West Virginia the opportunity to consume at a minimum two healthy meals at school each day. It also requires schools to implement at least one alternative model for distributing breakfast (such as those discussed in Breakfast Basics) aimed at increasing access to school breakfast for all students.

To reduce the stigma that often surrounds students that qualify for free or reduced meal programs, the law ensures that the Department of Education works with educators to maximize funds available in an effort to urge them to make school breakfast free for all students. Moreover, this legislation stimulates the local economy and raises awareness about agriculture by encouraging farm to table programs to increase the amount of healthy, local foods distributed in schools.^{xiiiiv}

With 27.3 percent of all Delaware households with children—more than one in every four families—experiencing food hardship, Delaware legislators urgently need to make school nutrition programs like this a priority.^{xv} Delaware's committed lawmakers can bring forth impacting, sustainable changes in the classroom by developing a comprehensive school nutrition bill modeled after the West Virginia Feed to Achieve Act.

Fortunately, Delaware has a great combination of necessary infrastructure and a network of caring individuals in the public, for-profit and non-profit sectors willing to partner to implement a similar program to schools in the state.



What can the average citizen do?

- Call or write to your local principal, superintendent or school board to share the information included in this report and to encourage them to take steps to make breakfast free and accessible to all students.
- Write a letter to your local newspaper advocating for breakfast in the classroom.
- Get involved in the Food Bank of Delaware's Coalition to End Hunger to advocate for breakfast around the state!

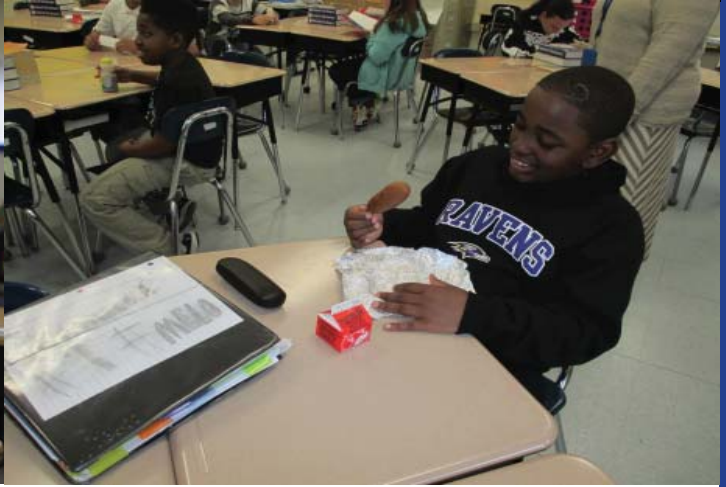
